- Sunset Whitney Recreation Area is Rocklin's 36th park
- It can take up to 2 weeks for 1 city employee to mow all of SWRA
 - Two of the "Twelve Bridges" built by the Whitney family are located on the SWRA property
 - The ponds have been cleaned out and a new float system has been installed to regulate water levels
 - This park has more than 14 different types of trees including oak, eucalyptus, olive, and many more!
 - Over 120 trees have been planted along the main entrance off of Midas Ave. thanks to the Helping Hands SWRA Beautification Project in April!
 - In the process of leveling out sand traps - leveling allows for mobility of the mower in these areas
 - Debris was removed in the area facing Sunset Blvd. This area also received hydro-seed for erosion control.
- A turf renovation project is underway along Midas Ave. to recreate the natural area which was a community attraction for picture taking. Park staff is hard at work trenching and installing irrigation, in preparation to sterilize the ground to properly hydro-seed this area.
- SWRA and Johnson-Springview Park are adjacent to one another and together total over 300 acres.
